# Founders Day June 10, 2024

89th Anniversary

Many of us know the story about Bill W. and Dr. Bob found in the book, Alcoholics Anonymous, a.k.a. Da Big Book. But do you know the relationship between Dr. Bob's last drink and Founders Day? And Bill W. gave him the beer to steady his hand and drove Dr Bob to the hospital so he could do surgery? June 10, 1035, is the day AA members consider to be the founding date of AA.

Around the world, many gather to recognize the Anniversary of Alcoholics Anonymous. This year marked the 89th anniversary. On Oahu, the fellowship got together with meetings, food, fun and fellowship at Palama Settlement and through your contributions to Oahu Intergroup the event remained open to members, family and friends. E komo mai! Come all the way in, and sit all the way down.

All the way across the pond, in Akron Ohio, 9,000 plus participants gathered to hear speakers share their experience, strength and hope. Stops at The Gate Lodge, Dr. Bob's Akron home, museum and a




of the Alcoholics Anonymous Fellowship is with us any longer, and we, their survivors, are on our own.

#### First International Convention

By 1950, 100,000 recovered alcoholics could be found worldwide. Spectacular though this was, the period 1940-1950 was nonetheless one of great uncertainty. The crucial question was whether all those mercurial alcoholics could live and work together in groups. Could they hold together and function effectively? This was the unsolved problem. The New York headquarters spent much time corresponding with thousands of groups about their questions.

By 1950, the earlier chaos had largely disappeared. A successful formula for A.A. unity and functioning had been achieved and put into practice.

A.A. held its first International Convention in Cleveland. There Dr. Bob made his last appearance and spoke in his final talk of the need to keep A.A. simple. He saw the Twelve Traditions enthusiastically adopted for the permanent use of the A.A. Fellowship throughout the world.

\* My good friends in A.A. and of A.A.,

... I get a big thrill out of looking over a vast sea of faces like this with a feeling that possibly some small thing I did a number of years ago played an infinitely small part in making this meeting possible. I also get quite a thrill when I think that we all had the same problem. We all did the same things. We all get the same results in proportion to our zeal and enthusiasm and stick-to-itiveness. If you will pardon the injection of a personal note at this time, let me say that I have been in bed five of the last seven months and my strength hasn't returned as I would like, so my remarks of necessity will be very brief.

There are two or three things that flashed into my mind on which it would be fitting to lay a little emphasis. One is the simplicity of our program. Let's not louse it all up with Freudian complexes and things that are interesting to the scientific mind, but have very little to do with our actual A.A. work. Our Twelve Steps, when simmered down to the last, resolve themselves into the words "love" and "service." We understand what love is, and we understand what service is. So let's bear those two things in mind.

Let us also remember to guard that erring tongue, and if we must use it, let's use it with kindness and consideration and tolerance.

And one more thing: None of us would be here today if somebody hadn't taken time to explain things to us, to give us a little pat on the back, to take us to a meeting or two, to do numerous little kind and thoughtful acts on our behalf. So let us never get such a degree of smug complacency that we're not willing to extend, or attempt to extend, to our less fortunate brothers that help which has been so beneficial to us.
